It is an intense journey from first knowing about <u>LivingMyPromise</u> to creating a will that gives half of your wealth to charity. We have been mapping this journey of individuals. That's when we noticed where many of us get stuck short of taking the LMP pledge. Speaking to some folks, we figured out three bottlenecks they face.

The first one is the reluctance to publicize one's giving.

It is commonly felt that one's giving should be secret, away from attention or glory. Signatories have realised that LMP is not about showing off your charity works to gain recognition, but about inspiring others to do more and helping set a higher benchmark for giving. As many as 15 of the 35 signatories signed up because they were inspired by one or more of the others.

The second one is the **desire to leave enough for one's children**.

Giving off 50% of your wealth might seem too much. What if your kids need that money for their education and future?

A #LivingMyPromise poll of 483 respondents showed that 72% of them wanted absolutely nothing from their parents' wealth. So ASKING your kids might be a good idea! And then, there was this <u>news</u> of a youth who dumped his father's gift, a luxury BMW, in the river because he wanted a Jaguar. Perhaps that's not what you want your kids to aspire for. You can help them experience the joy of giving. You can nurture kindness and generosity in children through <u>science-based strategies</u>.

The third reason is **procrastination**.

You are definitely planning to give back to society. But you're busy these days. You will probably do it some other day.

But we don't realize how short time can be and often give less priority to something like writing a will. To make it easy, LMP signatories get access to a range of resources including tips on how to structure their giving. We even have a <u>will template</u> ready for them.

So, don't delay in making this promise for the betterment of society. If you haven't done it yet, do it now. If not now, when?


